🎵 **Study on Child Sexual Abuse' in the Selected Sites of Four Northern States in India.** In association with World Vision India, researchers from the Anthropos India Foundation conducted qualitative micro-level research. The team collected data from four North Indian states - Punjab, Haryana, Rajasthan, and Delhi - and articulated child abuse issues in these states. The study examined child abuse cases' volume and intensities to understand the children's lived experiences of abuse. This research explores child abuse cases from their sociocultural determinants, and their different forms [physical, sexual, emotional, and neglect] to promote child protection with a more strategic and pragmatic approach.



In Mafiacraft, Deborah Puccio-Den discovers the Mafia's reliance on the force of silence; the author follows a novel ethnographic inquiry that emphasizes questions over the immortal quest for answers.

More than inquiring about previous material (verbalized or written), she explores silence's imaginative powers and articulates consistencies around special social ties that derive strength from indeterminable states. Around anthropological research, she raises new questions and opens new grounds for researching the world's most famous criminal organization.

THE COST OF TEARS

In the cultural land known for liveliness and royal exhibits, the Rudaali demonstrates traditional black spot. The upper-caste women disallowed public emotional demonstrations and expression and are sustained inside Havelis, behind veils. The Rudaali bereavement demonstrations substitute these women's veiled grief and tears. The black dress representing Yama; the God of Death becomes inherent to their monochromatic lives; unlike us, colours elude their emotions.

The Rudaali communities preserve upper-caste respect; preserve the women who cannot mourn publically. These communities center around sociopolitical issues like class, caste, and gender.

Furthermore prone to upper caste exploitation - paternal names are not provided to their children. Their girl children are celebrated as new community members to continue the grieving tradition. For 12 mourning days, their tears receive 5-6 rupees per day; the Rudaali women wail, roll and beat their breasts to receive old clothes and rice in return.

In their evolved world perspective, general societies prefer quieter funerals; these evolutions have reduced their social importance and significance. Their professional tears have dried due to unemployment. The Rudaalis have taken alternative livelihoods; they have left their traditional occupation behind the Rajwada and Raja walls.

ARCHAEOLOGY OF CLIMATE CHANGE

Anthropologists, geographers, and earth scientists collaborated to develop an evolving academic case of “archaeology of climate change,” which uses data from archaeological excavations and the paleoclimate record to study how humans interacted with their environment during the past climate-change events.

Scientists are trying to figure out the key points in climate history that trigger people to restructure their societies in order to survive. Thus, by examining the past and finding out how to adapt to the present, scientists hope to understand how to prepare for the future.
