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
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## PREVIOUS WORKS AND EVENTS

## IRAWATI KARVE

#### 15th December 1905 - 11th August 1970

Irawati Karve was an Indian anthropologist and educationist and a writer from Maharashtra. She was born on 15th December 1905 in Burma and grew up in Pune. She received her Bachelors in Philosophy from Fregusson College. She did her masters in sociology and M.Phil in Anthropology. She completed her Doctorate from University of Berlin in 1930. She served as the head of the Department of Sociology and Anthropology at Deccan College, Pune. She was invited by the School of Oriental and African Studies of the University of London in England in 1951-52 where she prepared the draft of her book on Kinship Organisation in India. An independent woman who had the reputation of being the first woman two-wheeler driver of Pune, she challenged and questioned caste system, family relationships, mythology, kinship and religion and wrote extensively on these topics. Her famous work Yuganta transformed our understanding of the Mahabharata and received the Sahitya Academy Award in 1968. We find influence of her mentor, G S Ghurye in her work on Chitpavan Brahmins and Folklore of Parshuram. She had an everlasting impact through her works and is a fine example of women's liberation.

# Career Choices in Anthropology

Anthropos India Foundation organized a two-day Anthropology Career Conclave on 22nd and 29th January 2022 for career guidance in anthropology. The event was attended by the undergraduate, graduate and research scholars from different disciplines across the country and also had few international students. A total of 64 young participants were guided by experts on different subject matters.

The first day of the conclave had Dr. Geeta M., Principal Secretary, Government of Chhattisgarh guiding the students on 'Anthropology and Civil Services'followed by Prof. Charu Smita Gupta, Deputy Director(Retd.), National Crafts Museum on 'Anthropology of Museology'. Mr. Bhaskar Venkatesh, Senior Marketing Consultant, delivered a talk on 'Anthropology in Business and Entrepreneurship' and Dr. Sunita Reddy from Jawaharlal Nehru University talked on 'Anthropology and Academics'. Prof. A. B. Ota, Director, SCSTRTI, Odisha gave a talk on 'Anthropology Careers in Tribal Research Institutes' and encouraged the young participants to actively engage in rigorous fieldwork.

The day two of the conclave started with Ms. Swasti Acharya's words on 'Anthropology, Al and Startups', followed by Prof. Kewal Krishan, from Panjab University on 'Anthropology and Careers in forensic Sciences'. Prof. N C Dash, from KISS delivered a talk on 'Careers in Population Anthropology' and Dr. Arbind Sinha, Advisor, CDMA-MICA on 'Anthropology and Communication'. Dr. Vipin Gupta from University of Delhi guided the participants on 'Anthropology and Careers in the field of Health' and Dr. Piyush Ranjan Sahoo, from AnSI on "Anthropology and Careers in Anthropological Survey of India". Late afternoon session was by Prof R. Siva Prasad on 'Anthropology in Development Sector - NGOs/ INGOs' and on 'Anthropology and filmmaking' by Dr. Alison L Kahn, Dr. Avitoli Zhimo.

All the sessions provided the participants with the opportunity to directly interact with the experts and seek guidance on their future in Anthropology.

# The Fear of the Visual? Photography, Anthropology, and Anxieties of Seeing



Photography had played a central role in the emergence of anthropology as a discipline in the late colonial period. Despite this, why is it that photography is not taken seriously in contemporary mainstream social anthropology and sociology in South Asia—and, to a great extent, in the rest of the worlds a possible way of conducting research or as an object of research? The fear of the visual? Explores this Question through a study of the histories of anthropology/ sociology and photography. The author studies past and present practices of photography - including contemporary practices such as the 'selfish', and the framing of social/ familial events such as wedding photography - and possibilities with regard to theorizing the visual. He also tries to understand the 'intellectual rupture' that led to the visual being removed from mainstream sociology/ social anthropology to the separate fields of visual sociology and visual anthropology. This book is as personal as it is academic. The author opens each Chapter with personal recollections, choosing to not separate the two domains that have impacted each other in important ways. Central to these personal narratives and the academic discussions that follow are photographs, which form a core part of the argument.

Sasanka Perera is Professor of Sociology at South Asian University, New Delhi and Editor, Society and Culture in South Asia. He is the author of Warzone Tourism in Sri Lanka: Tales from Darker Places in Paradise (2016), Violence and the Burden of Memory: Remembrance and Erasure in Sinhala Consciousness (2015), and Artists Remember and Artists Narrate: Memory and Representation in Sri Lankan Visual Arts (2012).




# Birsa Munda Memorial Udyan and Museum

Born on 15th November 1875, Birsa spent his childhood in the villages of Jharkhand and Bihar. He belonged to Munda tribe and joined the German Mission school by converting himself to Christianity on the recommendation of his teacher. Knowing British colonial rulers and their misdeeds, he started to have faith in 'Birsait'. Soon after Oraon tribes also joined the movement to challenge British conversion activities. He spent his time close to Sardars centre and got inspired to join anti-missionary and anti-government programs. On 3rd March, 1900, he was arrested by British police during his sleep and died in Ranchi jail on 9th June 1900 at the young age of 25. At a very young age he forced colonial officials to introduce laws protecting the land rights of tribals and popularly known by the name Dharti Aaba.



The Bhagwan Birsa Munda Smriti Udyan-sah-Swatantrata Senani Sangrahalaya has been developed in the Ranchi prison where Birsa died. On the occasion of India's first Tribal Day (Janjatiya Gaurav Diwas) i.e.,15th November 2021, the Honorable Prime Minister, Shri Narendra Modi ji inaugurated India's first Tribal Freedom Fighter Museum. In near future we would have another nine tribal freedom fighter museums in different states of the country. The museums will preserve and promote the music, crafts and handicrafts, and art-skills of tribal communities.
